DMARC collection: Last week's DMIEC collection netted \$1,515 for DMARC Emergency Food Pantry.

CHRISTMAS EVE COLLECTION

It's been our tradition to give our Christmas Eve collection to the Des Moines Catholic Worker House. This year the Worker House has designated the collection to help with general operating expenses, e.g., utilities, house maintenance, property taxes, gas and maintenance for the van, etc.

Despite their great resourcefulness, the Worker House still needs around \$75,000 a year to pay for the whole operation. This is a remarkably low price, given the immense amount of work that is done and the large number of people that they support. Every week, the Worker House serves between 400 and 600 hot meals, provides groceries and toiletries for some 100 families and individuals, provides blankets, clothes, and coats for dozens, if not hundreds, living outside. They also recently started offering free HIV and hepatitis C testing on Thursdays. During the open hours, guests can take a shower, use the bathroom, get a cup of coffee, watch T.V., or make a phone call, all while having a safe space to occupy.

Because the Catholic Worker House is not a 501(c)3 organization, checks must be made out to "Catholic Worker House" and not to "DMIEC."

Catholic Worker House Needs: Cold weather brings a need for warm items for the Catholic Worker House guests — jackets, socks, stocking caps, blankets, and sleeping bags. Other immediate needs: disposable razors, shaving cream, and deodorant. Please place your donations in the grocery cart in the coatroom.

SANCTUARY UPDATE: HELP WANTED

Here are immediate ways to help two El Salvadoran families living in Des Moines while seeking asylum:

- Join a support team to help coordinate assistance
- Identify where free and reduced-cost clothing is available
- Research availability of chronic medical care (as opposed to urgent medical care)
